

Notes for Contributors

To help keep production and subscription costs down, contributors are requested to submit material on disk or as an email attachment to: lea.beness@mq.edu.au in an IBM or Apple-Macintosh format, preferably in Microsoft Word. If this word-processing program is not available, please submit the article in Rich Text Format **excluding** any formatting commands (e.g., right justification, bold, italics etc.); a hard-copy version of the article in formatted form should be submitted with the disk or email attachment. Receipt will be acknowledged.

The editor's decision whether to publish a submission involves the consultation of one or more referees. This process is of unpredictable length but is carried out as quickly as possible.

References should normally be given in consecutively numbered footnotes, in the following way:

BOOKS

B. Rawson, *Children and Childhood in Roman Italy* (Oxford 2003) 114-33.

CHAPTERS

J. Hall, 'Cicero *Fam.* 16.21, Roman politeness, and the socialization of Marcus Cicero the Younger', in K. Welch and T.W. Hillard (eds), *Roman Crossings. Theory and Practice in the Roman Republic* (Swansea 2005) 259-78.

ARTICLES

T. Neal, 'Blood and Hunger in the *Iliad*', *CPh* 101 (2006) 15-33.

Abbreviations may follow the style of *L'Année philologique*.

ANCIENT AUTHORITIES

References to ancient authors and documents should generally be abbreviated in standard ways. Contributors may use, for example, the abbreviations listed at the beginning of the *Oxford Classical Dictionary*, the *Oxford Latin Dictionary*, Lewis and Short's *A Latin Dictionary* and Liddell and Scott's *Greek-English Lexicon*.

When a modern work is referred to more than once in footnotes, it is preferred that its full details be given only in the first footnote in which it appears; subsequent references should be by author's name and by this footnote number — for example, Neal (n.4) 18.

A bibliography of modern works cited should be provided at the end of the article.
